

Workforce Program

Office of Community Investment and Infrastructure (OCII)

- Good faith effort to employ San Francisco residents to perform 50% of total work hours
 - Contract-by-contract basis
- First Consideration given to residents of Project Areas
- CityBuild administers OCII's workforce program: referral of SF residents and day-to-day compliance
- Compliance measures:
 - Mandatory workforce kick-off meetings with Developers and GCs
 - Prior to start, preconstruction meetings with each subcontractor
 - Worker request forms and referral/hiring process
 - Weekly certified payroll reporting
 - Workforce compliance reports to Developers and Contractors




Workforce Challenges

Local hiring held relatively steady after COVID-19



Workforce Development Measures

- Proactive Measures: more deliberate in training and career guidance
 - Counseling residents to crafts with high demand and low availability, e.g. operating engineer, iron workers
- Removing Barriers:
 - Direct to Interview IBEW Local 6
 - TAAP (Trade Application Assistance Program): math and interview skills development, among others
 - Specialized training and "bridge" programs to address barriers to employment
 - Re-Entry Program Navigator, Veterans, Young Adults
- CityBuild continues to expand their academy to address demand, efforts include:
 - Working closely with SFUSD, private industry, and Community Based Organizations for outreach and recruitment
 - CityBuild Academy Cycle 31 and CAPSA Cycle 20 (October 2019 completion)
 - 78 Enrollments, 57 Graduates, 81% Placements
 - CityBuild Academy Cycle 32 (June 2020 completion)
 - 43 Graduates, 84% Placements
 - CityBuild Cycle 33 (started August 2020): 41 Enrollments, virtual and in-person
 - Special Training: Alice Griffith abatement certification




San Francisco-San Mateo County Metro Division Unemployment Rate Historical Trend

San Francisco unemployment rate was 12.5% in June 2020.

Construction job loss recuperated from May to June 2020 and is approx. 6.5% lower than June 2019.

Notably, construction jobs employed in February 2020 (before COVID-19) were 41,800, same as June 2020; but 11,700 jobs were lost from February to April 2020 and is recuperating.


